

Barrow, Alaska extension

June 25 - 27, 2005

Leaders: Barry Zimmer & Kevin Zimmer

Itinerary:

June 25 - early morning flight from Anchorage to Barrow; Freshwater Lake Road, Gaswell Road, Point Barrow (31 species)

June 26 - Gaswell Road to washout point, Freshwater Lake Road, Point Barrow (33 species; 38 total)

June 27 morning departure to Anchorage (38 total species)

Summary: We had a fantastic trip to Barrow this year with the best eider showing in some time. Spectacled Eider has been a difficult bird for nearly a decade now and Steller's has undergone a rather drastic decline over the past five years or so. This year we had an astonishing 15 Steller's our first afternoon along the Freshwater Lake road with excellent views of several pairs. Later that day we ventured out the Gaswell Road and walked up to within 50 feet of two male and one female Spectacled Eiders. The next day yielded an additional 7 Spectacleds, including five males in one group. It was great to see these two specialty birds of Barrow having a good year for a change. Our second day also produced a pair of Kings (plus an additional lone female) on a tundra pond that allowed close approach. We saw several flocks of Kings on our late night polar bear excursions along Point Barrow, but these were our only ones on the tundra. One male Common along Point Barrow our last night resulted in an eider sweep, and left many pondering which was the most spectacular eider of the fabulous group! We also did well with Snowy Owls which had crashed last year along with the lemmings. I believe last year's trip only saw one or two Snowys. We had about 15 individuals including a couple right next to the road. Other Barrow highlights included a Yellow-billed Loon along Point Barrow for some, and the regular shorebird fare with abundant displaying Pectorals, stunning Red Phalaropes on most of the ponds, and a Baird's Sandpiper on a nest.

Steller's Eider a total of 17 seen; as with Spectacled it was the best year for this species in at least five years
