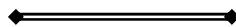

Malay Peninsula 2007

The Malay Peninsula is cloaked in incredible Sundaic rainforests where the diversity of Asian birdlife reaches its zenith. Our tour covers a variety of habitats at different altitudes, thus allowing us to observe and enjoy a range of the ever-exciting birds and other wildlife of this lush region.

Malaysia is one of the most pleasant, hassle-free countries to visit in Southeast Asia. It's buoyant and wealthy, and has moved towards a pluralist culture based on a vibrant and interesting fusion of Malay, Chinese, Indian, and indigenous cultures and customs. The rainforests of the Sunda region—Peninsular Malaysia, Borneo, and Sumatra—are the oldest in the world. They are also the densest and most humid, meaning that birding here can be a real challenge! Despite this, the rewards make it all worthwhile, with some of the most beautiful and exotic birds found on earth—many of them seen well on our tour. Other highlights of any trip to Southeast Asia should be the fabulous food, varied and exotic cultures, terrific people, and general atmosphere; I think we sampled all of these aspects very well (you will note I am avoiding any mention of leeches). The remarkable diversity of the forests in this part of the world is simply astounding, and new discoveries await us every time we venture out. After many years of birding and exploration in Malaysia, I still find many new and wonderful discoveries on every visit. Even little things like beetle larvae or two-foot-long gliding lizards beguile me such that I find this one of the most exciting places on earth. And what a privilege for a Malaysian Rail-babbler or a Crested Partridge to let us glimpse him as he goes about his secretive business! These are only two of many exceptionally remarkable birds found here.

We began on the Ulu Gombak road, a forested hilly area near Kuala Lumpur, which provides a terrific introduction to the very exciting forest birding of Malaysia. We got off to an excellent start with some great birds and a confiding group of the now rare white-handed gibbons. Arriving in the coastal lowlands of Kuala Selangor Nature Park in the afternoon, we began birding immediately. This is an important remnant of mangrove and coastal forests on the west coast north of Kuala Lumpur and we had great views of Gray Heron, the amazing Stork-billed Kingfisher, Coppersmith Barbet, Mangrove Whistler, and Laced Woodpecker amongst others. We also enjoyed some close up looks of silvered leaf-monkeys with their beautiful, bright orange babies.

A rather long and windy road trip took us to the jetty for our boat trip up the Sungai Tembeling to the immense tract of undisturbed rainforest of Taman Negara—Malaysia's largest national park. The next few days saw us searching this spectacular lowland rainforest and its waterways for glimpses of the secretive and marvelous wildlife to be found here. An afternoon boat trip up the Tahan River was one of the high points of our trip. Not only did we enjoy the stunningly beautiful riparian rainforest, but we also had some great looks at a number of sought-after species including Black-and-red Broadbill, the endangered Straw-headed Bulbul, and the unusual and not altogether attractive Dusky Broadbill. This year the Jenet Muda trail was the most active area for the forest birds and we caught up with some of the scarcer forest dwellers such as Cinnamon-rumped Trogon, Striped Wren-Babbler, Orange-backed Woodpecker, and Maroon-breasted Philentoma. On the Swamp Loop we found the nomadic and scarce Crested Wood Partridge, as well as the incredibly cryptic Malaysian Peacock-Pheasant. More trudging along various trails in the area rewarded us with outstanding views of Malaysian Rail-babbler—a major trip highlight, as well as Red-naped Trogon, many woodpeckers including Buff-rumped, Buff-necked, and Great Slaty, and Blue-winged Pitta. The fruiting trees in the vicinity of the resort provided plenty of nonstop entertainment with lots of pigeons, hornbills, barbets, and bulbuls. Taman Negara can be pretty hard work, but always captivating!

Next we proceeded to the beautiful montane forests of Fraser's Hill where we came to grips with some of the high altitude species including the bizarre Fire-tufted Barbet, the elegant Red-headed Trogon, and the cheeky Chestnut-capped Laughingthrush. During the colonial era the British escaped from the heat of the lowlands to Fraser's Hill, and the atmosphere is still one of laid-back relaxation. The pace of life is much more sedate than down in the lowlands. The cooler climate provides a welcome contrast to steamy Taman Negara. Up here at 1,300 meters (4,265 feet) the avifauna differs markedly from that at Taman Negara. This is where we first

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encountered the bewildering but exciting mixed feeding flocks that so characterize the Asian region; mixed flocks of Golden Babbler, Blue-winged Minla, Mountain Fulvetta, and Bronzed Drongo are often accompanied by Black-and-crimson Oriole, Blue Nuthatch, and other goodies. In the gullies we found Lesser Shortwing and Pygmy Wren-Babbler. Walking along the roads we encountered simply fabulous Sultan Tits, Black Laughingthrushes, bizarre Red-bearded Bee-eaters, and a host of others.

I'd especially like to thank Dennis for his good company and very able assistance with logistics. Above all, thank you all for your cheerful and fun company—we certainly had a lot of fun and I am very much looking forward to traveling with you again in the not-too-distant future!

Diary

Daily Itinerary

- 21 July** An early morning departure from Kuala Lumpur saw us arriving in the early morning on the Ulu Gombak road where we birded in the hill forests along the road. After at Kuala Selangor exploring the trails and forests before returning to our hotel in the nearby town.
- 22 July** After a morning's birding at Kuala Selangor we travelled to Kuala Tembeling on the Tembeling River. From here we loaded up our considerable luggage and boarded our river boat or sampan for the exciting journey upriver to Taman Negara National Park. We birded in the resort gardens before dinner.
- 23 July** This morning we birded around the resort gardens where a number of large trees were fruiting. Later we explored various trails.
- 24 July** We travelled down the Tembeling River by boat for 20 or so minutes to be dropped off at the Blau Trail where we tried both directions to the Blau and Yong hides to look for wren-babblers and rail-babblers, followed by a later lunch. In the afternoon we took sampans up the lovely Tahan River as far as the cataracts Lata Berkoh. A memorable experience!
- 25 July** This morning we ventured onto the Jenet Muda trail – one of the tougher walks to try our luck for the Great Argus and other shy denizens of the rainforest. In the afternoon we took it easy at the Tahan hide near the resort where our patience was rewarded with some excellent sightings.
- 26 July** Another crack at the Jenet Muda trail was very rewarding, the birding was all good without exception!
- 27 July** From Taman Negara we again took the boat down the river to Kuala Tembeling and, after pausing for lunch and owls at Jerantut, drove up to Fraser's Hill.
- 28 July** Birded along Telekom Loop in the morning before visiting the Jeriau Waterfall in the afternoon.
- 29 July** More birding on various trails and roads including the Telekom Loop and The Gap Road in the morning and the Up Road in the afternoon.
- 30 July** In order to look for some different birds we went down the hill to the lower end of the Gap Road. In the afternoon we looked again at the Telekom Loop.
- 31 July** Departed for Kuala Lumpur and the airport from where we all sadly went our separate ways.

BIRDS

NON-PASSERINES

1. Grey Heron *Ardea cinerea*
common at Kuala Selangor where we also observed a nesting colony.
2. Purple Heron *Ardea purpurea*
just one seen at Kuala Selangor.
3. Little Heron *Butorides striatus*
a total of four recorded at Kuala Selangor.
4. Black-crowned Night Heron *Nycticorax nycticorax*
two at Kuala Selangor.
5. Painted Stork
a few small groups of this escapee population were seen flying over KL causing a bit of confusion!
6. Lesser Whistling Duck *Dendrocygna javanica*
a group of four birds seen flying over the lagoon at Kuala Selangor.
7. Black-winged Kite *Elanus caeruleus*
one seen near Kuala Selangor.
8. Brahminy Kite *Haliastur Indus*
very common at Kuala Selangor.
9. Crested Serpent-Eagle *Spilornis cheela*
one seen very well on the down road at Fraser's Hill, where we had wonderful scope studies.
10. Crested Goshawk *Accipiter trivirgatus*
one was seen well in flight on our way to Kuala Selangor.
11. Black Eagle *Ictinaetus malayensis*
great views of one in flight over the Gap road at Fraser's Hill.
12. Rufous-bellied Eagle *Hieraaetus kienerii*
one lovely immature bird seen in flight on the down road from Fraser's Hill.
13. Changeable Hawk-Eagle *Spizaetus cirrhatus*
one seen in flight near Kuala Selangor, heard a few times over the resort and at the Bunbun Tahan hide in Taman Negara.
14. Blyth's Hawk-Eagle *Spizaetus alboniger*
two of this really beautiful raptor were seen at Fraser's Hill, once in less than salubrious surroundings at the Rubbish Dump.
15. Black-thighed Falconet *Microhierax fringillarius*
probably the same two or three birds were seen almost daily around the resort and the Bunbun Tahan hide at Taman Negara; also seen along the river.
16. Crested Partridge *Rollulus rouloul*
a small group was seen secretively wandering around the Swamp Loop trail, also seen briefly by Thomas on the Bukit Teresek trail.
17. Malaysian Peacock-Pheasant *Polyplectron malacense*
this very elusive pheasant was heard tantalisingly closely on a few occasions at Taman Negara and seen by a lucky few on the Swamp Trail!
18. Great Argus *Argusianus argus*
seen by Lucky Daphne!

19. White-breasted Waterhen *Amaurornis phoenicurus*
one seen at Kuala Selangor.
20. Red-wattled Lapwing *Vanellus indicus*
six were seen on sandbanks along the river on our trip into Taman Negara.
21. Rock Dove *Columba livia*
22. Spotted Turtle-Dove *Streptopelia chinensis*
a few seen at Kuala Selangor.
23. Barred Cuckoo-Dove *Macropygia unchall*
two sightings on Fraser's Hill.
24. Little Cuckoo-Dove *Macropygia ruficeps*
common on Fraser's Hill.
25. Emerald Dove *Chalcophaps indica*
up to six were seen almost daily in throughout the tour except on Fraser's Hill.
26. Zebra Dove *Geopelia striata*
a few at Kuala Selangor.
27. Little Green-Pigeon *Treron olax*
some large groups on two days at Taman Negara.
28. Pink-necked Pigeon *Treron vernans*
great views of this pretty bird that is very common at Kuala Selangor.
29. Orange-breasted Green Pigeon *Treron bicincta*
three birds were scoped from the Tahan Hide at Taman Negara.
30. Thick-billed Pigeon *Treron curvirostra*
quite common at Taman Negara where we recorded a high count of 50 birds on one day.
31. Large Green-Pigeon *Treron capellei*
just two seen by myself only at Taman Negara.
32. Yellow-vented Green-Pigeon *Treron seimundi*
a total of four were recorded near a fruiting tree on the lower slopes of Fraser's Hill above and below The Gap.
33. Jambu Fruit-Dove *Ptilinopus jambu*
incredible point-blank views of this stunning bird low in a tree at Kuala Selangor was a bit of a surprise.
34. Mountain Imperial-Pigeon *Ducula badia*
many sightings of this impressive behemoth at Taman Negara and Fraser's Hill.
35. Blue-rumped Parrot *Psittinus cyanurus*
seen in good numbers this year albeit nearly always as fly-overs.
36. Blue-crowned Hanging-Parrot *Loriculus galgulus*
seen daily at all low to mid elevation sites, including some very nice scope views.
37. Long-tailed Parakeet *Psittacula longicauda*
a total of seven birds were recorded at Taman Negara.
38. Large Hawk-Cuckoo *Cuculus sparverioides*
heard only this year.
39. Oriental Cuckoo *Cuculus saturatus*
great views of the very unusual looking juvenile at Fraser's Hill.
40. Banded Bay Cuckoo *Cacomantis sonneratii*
one seen and scoped in a tree full of caterpillars at Taman Negara.
41. Plaintive Cuckoo *Cacomantis merulinus*
surprisingly we only heard this species this year.

42. Violet Cuckoo *Chrysococcyx xanthorhynchus*
excellent scope views of a gorgeous male in the caterpillar tree at Taman Negara.
43. Asian Drongo-Cuckoo *Surniculus lugubris*
seen almost daily at Taman Negara.
44. Asian Koel *Eudynamys scolopacea*
seen and heard in the early morning at Kuala Selangor.
45. Black-bellied Malkoha *Phaenicophaeus diardi*
a total of three were recorded at Taman Negara.
46. Chestnut-bellied Malkoha *Phaenicophaeus sumatranus*
one was seen loping around the canopy on the Ulu Gombak road.
47. Green-billed Malkoha *Phaenicophaeus tristis*
a couple of observations from Fraser's Hill.
48. Raffles's Malkoha *Phaenicophaeus chlorophaeus*
this super and distinctly dimorphic bird was seen and heard daily at Taman Negara.
49. Chestnut-breasted Malkoha *Phaenicophaeus curvirostris*
one seen at Kuala Selangor and one at Taman Negara.
50. Short-toed Coucal *Centropus rectunguis*
one seen from the boat on our trip up the Tahan River, we also heard it on the Swamp Loop.
51. Greater Coucal *Centropus sinensis*
one seen at Kuala Selangor.
52. Barn Owl *Tyto alba*
we had great views of a bird in the oil palm plantations opposite Taman Negara during our night drive.
53. Reddish Scops Owl *Otus rufescens*
frustratingly heard only.
54. Mountain Scops Owl *Otus spilocephalus*
heard nightly at Fraser's Hill; notoriously difficult to see.
55. Spotted Wood Owl *Strix seloputo*
we found and scoped this giant beauty as it roosted in a huge tree in a busy shopping area of Jerantut (near Taman Negara).
56. Buffy Fish Owl
one seen by Thomas on the ground at the Tahan Hide.
57. Collared Owlet *Glaucidium brodiei*
one seen really well along the road up to Fraser's Hill, also heard daily there.
58. Edible-nest Swiftlet *sp.*
daily in Taman Negara.
59. Glossy Swiftlet *Collocalia esculenta*
recorded daily at Fraser's Hill.
60. Silver-rumped Needletail *Rhaphidura leucopygialis*
recorded almost daily except at Fraser's Hill.
61. Brown-backed Needletail *Hirundapus giganteus*
a few were seen most days at Taman Negara.
62. Asian Palm-Swift *Cypsiurus balasiensis*
some birds feeding amongst their eponymous palms as we travelled.
63. Little Swift *Apus affinis*
very common near all human habitation.

64. Grey-rumped Treeswift *Hemiprocne longipennis*
recorded daily at Taman Negara.
65. Whiskered Treeswift *Hemiprocne comata*
three seen on the Ulu Gombak road where we enjoyed great scope views.
66. Red-naped Trogon *Harpactes kasumba*
super looks at a pair of very handsome birds at Taman Negara.
67. Cinnamon-rumped Trogon *Harpactes orrhophaeus*
great looks at a lovely male on the trail at Taman Negara.
68. Scarlet-rumped Trogon *Harpactes duvaucelii*
only heard at Taman Negara.
69. Orange-breasted Trogon *Harpactes oreskios*
heard on the Up Road and the Gap Road at Fraser's Hill.
70. Red-headed Trogon *Harpactes erythrocephalus*
very nice views of up to four of this excellent bird for everyone at Fraser's Hill.
71. Banded Kingfisher *Lacedo pulchella*
heard on the Swamp Loop trail – as unresponsive as always!
72. Stork-billed Kingfisher *Pelargopsis capensis*
this amazing bird was seen a couple of times at Kuala Selangor.
73. White-throated Kingfisher *Halcyon smyrnensis*
many sightings at Kuala Selangor and in Taman Negara.
74. Collared Kingfisher *Todiramphus chloris*
very common and vocal on the coastal plains, we saw a few at Kuala Selangor.
75. Red-bearded Bee-eater *Nyctornis amictus*
this is really an astounding bird and always a big hit - we scoped a fabulous male feeding in a flowering tree full of bees and butterflies on The Gap road down from Fraser's Hill.
76. Blue-throated Bee-eater *Merops viridis*
many sightings of this really attractive bird along the Tembeling River into Taman Negara.
77. Blue-tailed Bee-eater *Merops philippinus*
just two seen along the river into Taman Negara.
78. Dollarbird *Eurystomus orientalis*
seen in ones or twos at Kuala Selangor and along the waterways of Taman Negara.
79. Oriental Pied Hornbill *Anthracoceros albirostris*
excellent looks at up to eight birds on different occasions feeding in the fruiting trees around the resort at Taman Negara.
80. Black Hornbill *Anthracoceros malayanus*
just one was seen this year in Taman Negara.
81. Rhinoceros Hornbill *Buceros rhinoceros*
some brilliant sightings of this very exciting bird in Taman Negara. Great stuff!
82. Helmeted Hornbill *Buceros vigil*
although we heard this bird a few times, sightings were less easy to come by unfortunately.
83. Great Hornbill *Buceros bicornis*
definitely a trip highlight with a total of four recorded including one superb male which obligingly flew over us, alighted on a nearby tree and exhibited many facets of its behaviour for our enlightenment!
84. Wreathed Hornbill *Aceros undulates*
a gorgeous perched pair were seen from our boat into Taman Negara. They are notably dimorphic with the males being larger with a big, yellow gular pouch while the females are more delicate with a blue gular pouch.

85. Fire-tufted Barbet *Psilopogon pyrolophus*
surely one of the most unusual and exciting birds in the world! One of the treats of a visit to Fraser's Hill is to see this peculiar species in all its glory – we had great views of many birds daily. This bird can only be seen on the Malay Peninsula and Sumatra.
86. Gold-whiskered Barbet *Megalaima chrysopogon*
seen and heard almost daily throughout.
87. Red-throated Barbet *Megalaima mystacophanos*
heard almost daily and seen very well a number of times at Taman Negara.
88. Black-browed Barbet *Megalaima oorti*
seen and heard daily on Fraser's Hill.
89. Yellow-crowned Barbet *Megalaima henricii*
heard daily almost throughout.
90. Blue-eared Barbet *Megalaima australis*
heard almost daily with one seen the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.
91. Coppersmith Barbet *Megalaima haemacephala*
many were seen at Kuala Selangor and Taman Negara.
92. Brown Barbet *Calorhamphus fuliginosus*
up to 12 were seen very well at Taman Negara.
93. Speckled Piculet *Picumnus innominatus*
one was seen briefly on Fraser's Hill.
94. Rufous Piculet *Sasia abnormis*
one was seen briefly on Fraser's Hill.
95. Sunda Woodpecker *Dendrocopos moluccensis*
a total of four seen at Kuala Selangor.
96. Rufous Woodpecker *Celeus brachyurus*
we recorded a total of three records on separate days in Taman Negara.
97. White-bellied Woodpecker *Dryocopus javensis*
a pair of birds flew around noisily overhead as we were frustrated by the thick canopy that is characteristic of the Sundaic rainforests, allowing only brief glimpses.
98. Banded Woodpecker *Picus mineaceus malaccensis*
super views of two birds on the trails at Taman Negara, the race in the peninsula is quite different to that of north Borneo – another possible split?
99. Crimson-winged Woodpecker *Picus puniceus*
very nice views on a number of occasions for all at Taman Negara of this very smart representative of those perennial favourites, the woodpeckers.
100. Greater Yellownappe *Picus flavinucha*
a total of three birds were seen on separate days at Fraser's Hill.
101. Laced Woodpecker *Picus vittatus*
both males and females of this coastal species was seen brilliantly at Kuala Selangor, a total of six.
102. Common Flameback *Dinopium javanense*
delightful scope views of up to four birds in the mangrove forests of the Kuala Selangor.
103. Bamboo Woodpecker *Gecinulus viridis*
one was seen very, very briefly by Thomas and Susan on the last day along the Gap Road at Fraser's Hill.
104. Maroon Woodpecker *Blythipicus rubiginosus*
cracking looks at one on the Ulu Gombak road and one at Taman Negara.

105. Orange-backed Woodpecker *Reinwardtipicus validus*
a super male and female cooperated well on the Jenet Muda trail at Taman Negara.
106. Buff-rumped Woodpecker *Meiglyptes tristis*
three recorded on different days at Taman Negara.
107. Buff-necked Woodpecker *Meiglyptes tukki*
the most common woodpecker in Taman Negara, where we recorded it daily often in scrubby habitat.
108. Grey-and-buff Woodpecker *Hemicircus concretus*
this bird is remarkable for the size of its crest – making its head appear larger than its body. We enjoyed point blank looks of a male and female in the campground at Taman Negara.
109. Great Slaty Woodpecker *Mulleripicus pulverulentus*
heard more often than seen but this astounding creature, one of the largest woodpeckers in the world, was seen really well at the Tahan Hide at Taman Negara.

PASSERINES

110. Banded Pitta *Pitta guajana*
heard just once at the Blau Hide, Taman Negara.
111. Garnet Pitta *Pitta granatina*
heard a few times but never close enough.
112. Blue-winged Pitta *Pitta moluccensis*
a amazingly responsive bird shot into view for everyone to admire at length.
113. Dusky Broadbill *Corydon sumatranus*
a small group of this remarkable species was seen on the Tahan River.
114. Black-and-red Broadbill *Cymbirhynchus macrorhynchus*
another spectacular and happily not uncommon species seen mostly along watercourses but also at the head of the Swamp Loop at Taman Negara.
115. Banded Broadbill *Eurylaimus javanicus*
this is one of the most elusive of the broadbills and as usual was heard more often than seen, we did see two super birds at the head of the Tahan trail (near the campground).
116. Black-and-yellow Broadbill *Eurylaimus ochromalus*
a perennial favourite – the clown-like appearance and gorgeous colouring of this small broadbill is very appealing – we enjoyed a number of great looks during our stay in Taman Negara.
117. Green Broadbill *Calyptomena viridis*
stunning looks at yet another amazing broadbill on the trails at Taman Negara. The incomparable green of this species is memorable indeed.
118. Pacific Swallow *Hirundo tahitica*
seen daily throughout.
119. Striated Swallow *Cecropis striolata badia*
one bird of the distinctive red-bellied *badia* race was seen foraging in the rubbish dump at Fraser's Hill.
120. Grey Wagtail *Motacilla cinerea*
many at the rubbish dump at Fraser's Hill.
121. Paddyfield Pipit *Anthus rufulus*
recorded at Taman Negara on our night drive and at Fraser's Hill on the golf course.
122. Dark-throated Oriole *Oriolus xanthonotus*
one or two were seen or heard at Taman Negara.

123. Black-naped Oriole *Oriolus chinensis*
although a common garden bird in Malaysia, we only saw this species at Kuala Selangor where it is very common.
124. Black-and-crimson Oriole *Oriolus cruentus*
up to four were seen daily on Fraser's Hill.
125. Javan Cuckoo-shrike *Coracina javensis*
up to four were seen daily on Fraser's Hill.
126. Bar-bellied Cuckoo-shrike *Coracina striata*
a very handsome male and female were seen in a fruiting tree at Taman Negara.
127. Grey-chinned Minivet *Pericrocotus solaris montanus*
not uncommon on Fraser's Hill. The male of the *montanus* race of Peninsula Malaysia has a dark throat, while the female has a yellow throat, which can lead to some confusion.
128. Scarlet Minivet *Pericrocotus flammeus*
many seen in Taman Negara and at lower elevations below Fraser's Hill.
129. Bar-winged Flycatcher-shrike *Hemipus picatus*
a couple at Taman Negara and a number were seen along the lower reaches of the Old Road at Fraser's Hill.
130. Black-winged Flycatcher-shrike *Hemipus hirundinaceus*
a total of five seen at Taman Negara, mostly around the campground.
131. Rufous-winged Philentoma *Philentoma pyrhopterum*
up to three recorded at Taman Negara.
132. Maroon-breasted Philentoma *Philentoma velatum*
great looks at a total of four male birds in Taman Negara.
133. Large Woodshrike *Tephrodornis gularis*
just one seen briefly at Taman Negara.
134. Straw-headed Bulbul *Pycnonotus zeylanicus*
this large, riparian bulbul is quite attractive but its most remarkable feature is its simply beautiful, liquid song. Unfortunately, this has led to a great demand for the species as a cage-bird both locally and internationally. As a result the Straw-headed Bulbul has declined markedly throughout its range to the extent that Peninsula Malaysia, and Taman Negara, in particular remains the only place where one can realistically expect to see this wonderful bird. We saw it almost daily during our stay at Taman Negara with a high count of eight on our boat trip down the Tahan. This year remarkably we encountered many in the resort gardens.
135. Black-headed Bulbul *Pycnonotus atriceps*
very common on the Ulu Gombak road and Taman Negara.
136. Black-crested Bulbul *Pycnonotus melanicterus*
seen daily at Fraser's Hill.
137. Puff-backed Bulbul *Pycnonotus eutilotus*
one on the Ulu Gombak road, two at Taman Negara.
138. Stripe-throated Bulbul *Pycnonotus finlaysoni*
very common at Taman Negara where seen daily.
139. Yellow-vented Bulbul *Pycnonotus goiavier*
Seen at most disturbed and garden sites.
140. Red-eyed Bulbul *Pycnonotus brunneus*
very common at Kuala Selangor and Taman Negara.
141. Cream-vented Bulbul *Pycnonotus simplex*
this bird lives up to its specific name! One seen on the Ulu Gombak road.

142. Spectacled Bulbul *Pycnonotus erythroptalmos*
Taman Negara.
143. Ochraceous Bulbul *Alophoixus ochraceus*
quite common in the forests of Fraser's Hill; often associating with mixed flocks.
144. Grey-cheeked Bulbul *Alophoixus bres*
two at Taman Negara.
145. Yellow-bellied Bulbul *Alophoixus phaeocephalus*
a few seen daily at Taman Negara.
146. Hairy-backed Bulbul *Tricholestes criniger*
seen almost daily in Taman Negara.
147. Streaked Bulbul *Ixos malaccensis*
one seen in a fruiting tree at Taman Negara.
148. Mountain Bulbul *Ixos maclellandii*
seen almost daily at Fraser's Hill.
149. Asian Fairy-bluebird *Irena puella*
this stunning bird was seen or heard almost daily throughout.
150. Greater Green Leafbird *Chloropsis sonnerati*
two on the Ulu Gombak road.
151. Lesser Green Leafbird *Chloropsis cyanopogon*
one or two sightings on the trails at Taman Negara.
152. Blue-winged Leafbird *Chloropsis cochinchinensis*
good views of males and females at Taman Negara and below The Gap at Fraser's Hill.
153. Common Iora *Aegithina tiphia*
Kuala Selangor and Taman Negara.
154. Green Iora *Aegithina viridissima*
good looks at one or two at Taman Negara.
155. Malaysian Whistling Thrush *Myophonus robinsoni*
heard on Fraser's Hill.
156. Lesser Shortwing *Brachypteryx leucophrys*
amazing views of a male along the Telekom Loop at Fraser's Hill. A gorgeous songster and really cute!
157. Oriental Magpie-Robin *Copsychus saularis*
Seen daily throughout. OK, so it's all over the place but it really is a lovely bird and surely an ornament to any garden!
158. White-rumped Shama *Copsychus malabaricus*
although commonly heard, this pretty bird is a little harder to see. That said, we enjoyed nice looks almost daily at Taman Negara.
159. White-crowned Forktail *Enicurus ruficapillus*
great close looks at this very Asian beauty on a couple of occasions on the Jenet Muda trail at Taman Negara.
160. Slaty-backed Forktail *Enicurus schistaceus*
up to 14 birds were encountered along the roads at Fraser's Hill, eventually we all had great looks.
161. Mountain Tailorbird *Orthotomus cuculatus*
seen or heard daily on Fraser's Hill.
162. Common Tailorbird *Orthotomus sutorius*
seen daily in the resort gardens of Taman Negara.

163. Dark-necked Tailorbird *Orthotomus atrogularis*
seen and heard at Taman Negara.
164. Ashy Tailorbird *Orthotomus ruficeps*
very common at Kuala Selangor.
165. Mountain Leaf-Warbler *Phylloscopus trivirgatus*
Fraser's Hill.
166. Chestnut-crowned Warbler *Seicercus castaniceps*
in small numbers in mixed flocks at Fraser's Hill.
167. Yellow-bellied Warbler *Abroscopus superciliaris*
common on The Gap road at Fraser's Hill.
168. Rufescent Prinia *Prinia rufescens*
one seen very well in scrubby grass on the Ulu Gombak road; two on the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.
169. Yellow-bellied Prinia *Prinia flaviventris*
great views of a couple of responsive birds at Kuala Selangor, heard across the river at Taman Negara.
170. Rufous-browed Flycatcher *Ficedula solitaries*
super looks at a very handsome bird, Fraser's Hill; a total of four birds recorded there.
171. Little Pied Flycatcher *Ficedula westermanni*
up to eight seen on Fraser's Hill.
172. Verditer Flycatcher *Eumyias thalassina*
recorded daily on Fraser's Hill.
173. Large Niltava *Niltava grandis*
up to five of this pretty flycatcher seen at Fraser's Hill.
174. Pale Blue Flycatcher *Cyornis unicolor*
two were seen on the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.
175. Hill Blue-Flycatcher *Cyornis banyumas*
one adult seen in low vegetation on the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.
176. Grey-headed Canary-Flycatcher *Culicicapa ceylonensis*
seen on the Ulu Gombak road and Fraser's Hill.
177. White-throated Fantail *Rhipidura albicollis*
daily at Fraser's Hill.
178. Pied Fantail *Rhipidura javanica*
common at Kuala Selangor.
179. Black-naped Monarch *Hypothymis azurea*
seen or heard daily at Taman Negara.
180. Asian Paradise Flycatcher *Terpsiphone paradise*
seen or heard most days at Taman Negara.
181. White-chested Babbler *Trichastoma rostratum*
quite common along waterways in Taman Negara.
182. Ferruginous Babbler *Trichastoma bicolour*
two at Taman Negara.
183. Abbott's Babbler *Malacocincla abbotti*
recorded daily in Taman Negara where the "three beers for me" song is a distinctive sound of the rainforest.
184. Short-tailed Babbler *Malacocincla malaccensis*
a few seen in Taman Negara.

185. Black-capped Babbler *Pellorneum capistratum*
although heard daily in Taman Negara, this species is quite secretive.
186. Buff-breasted Babbler *Pellorneum tickelli*
a few seen on the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.
187. Moustached Babbler *Malacopteron magnirostre*
a total of five were recorded at various times along the Jenet Muda trail at Taman Negara.
188. Sooty-capped Babbler *Malacopteron affine*
seen daily in Taman Negara.
189. Scaly-crowned Babbler *Malacopteron cinereum*
one or two sightings in Taman Negara.
190. Rufous-crowned Babbler *Malacopteron magnum*
Taman Negara.
191. Chestnut-backed Scimitar-Babbler *Pomatorhinus montanus*
a very good year for this species with a total of four on the Jenet Muda trail at Taman Negara and one along the Gap Road at Fraser's Hill.
192. Striped Wren-Babbler *Kenopia striata*
a delightful pair seen very well on the Jenut Muda trail in Taman Negara.
193. Large Wren-Babbler *Napothera macrodactyla*
frustratingly only heard on the Yong trail in Taman Negara.
194. Streaked Wren-Babbler *Napothera brevicaudata*
just one bird showed briefly this year at Fraser's Hill.
195. Pygmy Wren-Babbler *Pnoepyga pusilla*
eventually we all had good to great looks of this sneaky but very cute bird on Fraser's Hill.
196. Rufous-fronted Babbler *Stachyris rufifrons*
heard at Taman Negara.
197. Golden Babbler *Stachyris chrysaea*
one of the main constituents of mixed flocks on Fraser's Hill, with close looks this is a rather glamorous bird!
198. Grey-throated Babbler *Stachyris nigriceps*
this rather skulking species seen well on the Ulu Gombak road and on Fraser's Hill.
199. Grey-headed Babbler *Stachyris poliocephala*
an excellent sighting of two birds on the Jenet Muda trail in Taman Negara.
200. Black-throated Babbler *Stachyris nigricollis*
seen very, very well on the Swamp Loop in Taman Negara.
201. Chestnut-rumped Babbler *Stachyris maculate*
a rowdy group of four on the Jenet Muda trail at Taman Negara.
202. Chestnut-winged Babbler *Stachyris erythroptera*
seen and heard daily in Taman Negara.
203. Striped Tit-Babbler *Macronous gularis*
Kuala Selangor; Taman Negara.
204. Silver-eared Mesia *Leiothrix argentauris*
such a fabulous bird and fortunately quite common in mixed flocks on Fraser's Hill.
205. White-browed Shrike-Babbler *Pteruthius flaviscapis*
some great sightings of this cracking bird on a number of occasions on Fraser's Hill.
206. Black-eared Shrike-Babbler *Pteruthius melanotis*
another great babbler seen in mixed flocks throughout our stay at Fraser's Hill.

207. White-hooded Babbler *Gampsorhynchus rufulus*
a star bird for sure! This bamboo specialist was seen exceptionally well below the Gap at Fraser's Hill.
208. Blue-winged Minla *Minla cyanouroptera*
if you squint and look sideways you might be able to see some blue in the wings of this *sordidior* Peninsula Malaysia race! This rather plain-looking babbler was seen in high numbers on all days during our stay at Fraser's Hill, sometimes in surprisingly large and active flocks.
209. Brown Fulvetta *Alcippe brunneicauda*
two or three on the trails, Taman Negara.
210. Mountain Fulvetta *Alcippe peracensis*
very common in mixed flocks on Fraser's Hill.
211. Long-tailed Sibia *Heterophasia picaoides*
one of the commonest birds around the Fraser's Hill village.
212. White-bellied Erpornis *Erpornis zantholeuca*
a few seen at Fraser's Hill.

NOTE: As I mentioned to some during our travels, it is highly likely that the babblers are not one homogeneous group and in fact consist of a number of disparate families (see Cibois, A. *The Auk* 120(1):35–54, 2003). Recent work on this species even suggests that it is not related to any of the other groups treated as babblers in the current taxonomy. Most surprisingly initial studies suggest that White-bellied Yuhina should be placed with the corvids! Therefore, it must be removed from the *Yuhina* genus and the original genus *Erpornis* has been reinstated. (Cibois, A., *et al.* 2002. Molecular phylogenetics of babblers (Timaliidae): reevaluation of the genera *Yuhina* and *Stachyris*. – *J. Avian Biol.* 33: 380–390.)

213. Black Laughingthrush *Garrulax lugubris*
up to six were seen on the lower stretches of the Gap Road at Fraser's Hill and a further group of four or so were seen below The Gap on our last morning.
214. Chestnut-capped Laughingthrush *Garrulax mitratus*
common and confiding, seen daily on Fraser's Hill.
215. Chestnut-crowned Laughingthrush *Garrulax erythrocephalus*
usually scarcer than the preceding species, three were seen outside our hotel at Fraser's Hill.
216. Mangrove Whistler *Pachycephala grisola*
one was seen very well along the mangrove boardwalk at Kuala Selangor.
217. Golden-bellied Gerygone *Gerygone sulphurea*
a few seen well at Kuala Selangor.
218. Malaysian Rail-babbler *Eupetes macrocerus*
arguably bird of the trip! We repeated last year's big success with more amazing looks for all present at this scarce and secretive bird on the trails at Taman Negara. This species is seldom seen on bird tours. This species is variously classified with the Babblers (Timalidae) or the Quail-thrushes and Jewel-babblers (Cinlostomidae) but it would seem that opinion is leaning more towards the latter in recent literature (Schodde, R. & I. J. Mason. 1999. *The Directory of Australian Birds: Passerines*. CSIRO Publishing).
219. Great Tit *Parus major*
common at Kuala Selangor. Interestingly, this species seems to be restricted to mangrove and coastal forests on Peninsula Malaysia.
220. Sultan Tit *Melanochlora sultanea*
we found up to four of this very glamorous species on Fraser's Hill and we enjoyed great looks at its striking black and yellow plumage.
221. Blue Nuthatch *Sitta azurea*
yet another fabulous FH gem! Never in high numbers here, we nevertheless got some great close, eye level views eventually – a personal favourite.

- 222. Plain-throated Sunbird *Anthreptes malacensis*
Kuala Selangor.
- 223. Ruby-cheeked Sunbird *Chalcoparia singalensis*
a handsome and unusual-looking sunbird, seen a couple of times at Kuala Selangor and in Taman Negara.
- 224. Purple-naped Sunbird *Hypogramma hypogrammicum*
a number of sightings from Taman Negara, mostly along the Tahan trail. Another unusual sunbird somewhat reminiscent of a spiderhunter.
- 225. Yellow-bellied Sunbird *Cinnyris jugularis*
a few around our hotel in KL.
- 226. Black-throated Sunbird *Aethopyga saturate*
delightfully common on Fraser's Hill.
- 227. Little Spiderhunter *Arachnothera longirostra*
one or two in Taman Negara; not uncommon in mixed flocks on Fraser's Hill.
- 228. Grey-breasted Spiderhunter *Arachnothera modesta*
one seen at Taman Negara.

NOTE: The name *A. affinis* was based on birds from Java and subsequently used for all streaked, grey-breasted spiderhunters for all of the Greater Sundas. However, recent work has shown that the Javan birds are the same as the montane Bornean birds *A. affinis* and that the smaller, less streaked birds of the Bornean lowlands, Sumatra and the Malay Peninsula represent a separate species *A. modesta*. The name Bornean Spiderhunter *A. everetti* has been incorrectly applied. (See *The Birds of Borneo* by Smythies and Davison, 1999.) Very confusing as a number of the field guides persist with the old taxonomy!

- 229. Streaked Spiderhunter *Arachnothera magna*
a truly remarkable bird seen daily, and very well, on Fraser's Hill.
- 230. Yellow-vented Flowerpecker *Dicaeum chrysorrheum*
Ulu Gombak.
- 231. Fire-breasted Flowerpecker *Dicaeum ignipectus*
seen almost daily on Fraser's Hill.
- 232. Oriental White-eye *Zosterops palpebrosus*
Kuala Selangor.
- 233. Everett's White-eye *Zosterops everetti*
common on Fraser's Hill.
- 234. Bronzed Drongo *Dicrurus aeneus*
Taman Negara; Fraser's Hill.
- 235. Lesser Racket-tailed Drongo *Dicrurus remifer*
many sightings on Fraser's Hill.
- 236. Greater Racket-tailed Drongo *Dicrurus paradiseus*
common in Taman Negara where seen daily.
- 237. Crested Jay *Platylophus galericulatus*
very elusive this year and heard only, Taman Negara.
- 238. Black Magpie *Platysmurus leucopterus*
remarkably one or two were hanging around a fruiting tree in the resort gardens throughout our stay at Taman Negara. Great vocalisations!
- 239. Common Green Magpie *Cissa chinensis*
another unforgettable Malaysian bird – we enjoyed some stunning looks on our first morning at Fraser's Hill.

- 240. House Crow *Corvus splendens*
Kuala Lumpur.
- 241. Slender-billed Crow *Corvus enca*
a few at Taman Negara.
- 242. Large-billed Crow *Corvus macrorhynchos*
common in Taman Negara especially around the town.
- 243. Asian Glossy Starling *Aplonis panayensis*
Kuala Selangor; Taman Negara.
- 244. Common Myna *Acridotheres tristis*
Kuala Selangor; Taman Negara; various towns.
- 245. Jungle Myna *Acridotheres fuscus*
two at Kuala Selangor
- 246. Javan Myna *Acridotheres javanicus*
very common at Kuala Selangor.
- 247. Common Hill Myna *Gracula religiosa*
one at Kuala Selangor; a few seen at Taman Negara.
- 248. Eurasian Tree Sparrow *Passer montanus*
throughout the lowland areas.
- 249. White-rumped Munia *Lonchura striata*
many along the Up Road at Fraser's Hill.

MAMMALS

- 1. Malaysian Colugo *Cyanocephalus variegatus*
unexpectedly point blank views as one glided into a tree right next to us in the Tahan Hide in the early morning. This is definitely one of the world's most unusual mammals.
- 2. Slow Loris *Nycticebus coucang*
brilliant looks as we spotlit one on our night drive at Taman Negara.
- 3. Silvered Leaf Monkey *Presbytis cristata*
Kuala Selangor.
- 4. Banded Leaf Monkey
Ulu Gombak
- 5. Spectacled or Dusky Leaf Monkey *Presbytis obscurus*
Fraser's Hill.
- 6. Long-tailed (Crab-eating) Macaque *Macaca fascicularis*
Kuala Selangor; Ulu Gombak; Taman Negara.
- 7. Pig-tailed Macaque *Macaca nemistrina*
one on our boat ride out from Taman Negara.
- 8. White-handed Gibbon *Hylobates agilis*
a fabulous family of three put on a super show for us at Ulu Gombak.
- 9. Siamang *Hylobates syndactylus*
close views of a feeding male in the Genting Highlands.

10. Giant Pied Squirrel *Ratuffa bicolor*
bried looks here and there.
11. Plantain Squirrel *Callosciurus notatus*
Kuala Selangor.
12. Black-banded Squirrel *Callosciurus nigrovittatus*
Taman Negara.
13. Grey-bellied Squirrel *Callosciurus caniceps*
Taman Negara.
14. Horse-tailed Squirrel *Sundasciurus hippurus*
Fraser's Hill.
15. Himalayan Striped Squirrel *Tamiops macclellandi*
Common at Fraser's Hill.
16. Three-striped Ground Squirrel *Lariscus insignis*
one seen by Thomas at Taman Negara.
17. Plain Pygmy Squirrel
a couple at Taman Negara.
18. Smooth-coated Otter *Lutra perspicillata*
up to seven were seen well at Kuala Selangor.
19. Masked Palm Civet *Paguma larvata*
one was spotlit at Taman Negara.
20. Large Indian Civet *Viverra zibetha*
great looks at one hunting in the grass at the Tahan Hide at Taman Negara.
21. Leopard Cat *Felis bengalensis*
one seen hunting on our night drive at Taman Negara. A real beauty!
22. Eurasian Wild Pig *Sus scrofa*
Taman Negara (where disturbingly tame!) and living under Pat's cabin!
23. Lesser Mouse-Deer *Tragulus javanicus*
one or two brief sightings at Taman Negara.
24. Barking Deer *Muntiacus muntjac*
Taman Negara.
25. Sambar *Cervus unicolor*
common in the grounds of the resort at Taman Negara where they come out to graze overnight.
